Organizational Background and Legal Status

FEEDER: The Federation for Environment, Education, Development and Equal Rights is a well-established, non-profit making, non-political, non-Governmental and non-sectarian charitable and welfare organization dedicated to promoting sustainable development and social equity in Pakistan. FEEDER was founded in 2005 by Dr. Abrar Ahmad, a committed development professional with extensive experience in community development, social mobilization, and humanitarian response. Since its inception, the organization has been working to improve the socio-economic conditions of marginalized and underserved populations, with a particular focus on remote, rural, and urban-poor communities.

In 2008, FEEDER was formally registered under the Societies Registration Act 1860 with the Provincial Registrar Joint Stock Companies and Societies, Khyber Pakhtunkhwa (KP), Peshawar, Government of Pakistan, bearing Registration Number 5541. This legal registration provides FEEDER with a strong institutional foundation and enables it to operate transparently and accountably in accordance with national laws and regulatory frameworks.

To further strengthen its institutional capacity and enhance its contribution to human resource development, FEEDER obtained affiliation with the Skill Development Council (SDC), Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Peshawar in 2010. Through this affiliation, FEEDER is authorized to design and implement market-oriented skill development programs and to issue diplomas and certifications in various vocational and technical trades. These initiatives aim to improve employability, promote self-reliance, and support sustainable livelihoods among youth, women, and other vulnerable groups.

In addition, FEEDER is also registered with the Charity Commission, Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Government of Pakistan, ensuring compliance with provincial charitable regulations and reinforcing its commitment to transparency, good governance, and ethical operational standards.

Over the years, FEEDER has successfully planned, implemented, and completed a wide range of development and humanitarian projects in collaboration with international and national donor organizations, philanthropic individuals, and Government of Pakistan departments. The organization's programmatic interventions have focused on improving livelihoods, enhancing access to education and skills, strengthening environmental protection, supporting health and WASH initiatives, promoting disaster risk reduction (DRR), and responding to emergencies.

FEEDER has a strong grassroots presence and has worked extensively in the Districts of Kohistan, Shangla, Battagram and Mansehra, targeting marginalized and deserving communities in both urban and rural settings. Through participatory approaches and close coordination with local stakeholders, FEEDER continues to contribute meaningfully to sustainable development, social inclusion, and equal rights for disadvantaged populations.

Promote fruit orchard development as a long-term and sustainable source of income generation, enabling farming households to increase productivity, strengthen economic resilience, improve food security, and create lasting livelihood opportunities for present and future generations.

4. Environmental Conservation and Climate Action

Promote environmental sustainability through afforestation, biodiversity conservation, improved sanitation and hygiene practices, sustainable natural resource management, renewable energy solutions, climate change adaptation, and environmental awareness initiatives.

5. Education, Literacy, and Human Resource Development

Improve access to quality education, literacy, non-formal education, vocational training, digital literacy, and lifelong learning opportunities, particularly for children, youth, women, persons with disabilities, and other marginalized groups.

6. Digital Inclusion and Responsible Technology

Bridge the digital divide in underserved communities.
Provide access to digital tools and internet connectivity.
Educate communities on cyber security and safe technology use.
Digital exclusion and AI-related inequalities

Improve community health and well-being through health awareness campaigns, access to essential healthcare services, maternal and child health programs, nutrition interventions, mental health support, disease prevention initiatives, and emergency health response during crises and pandemics.

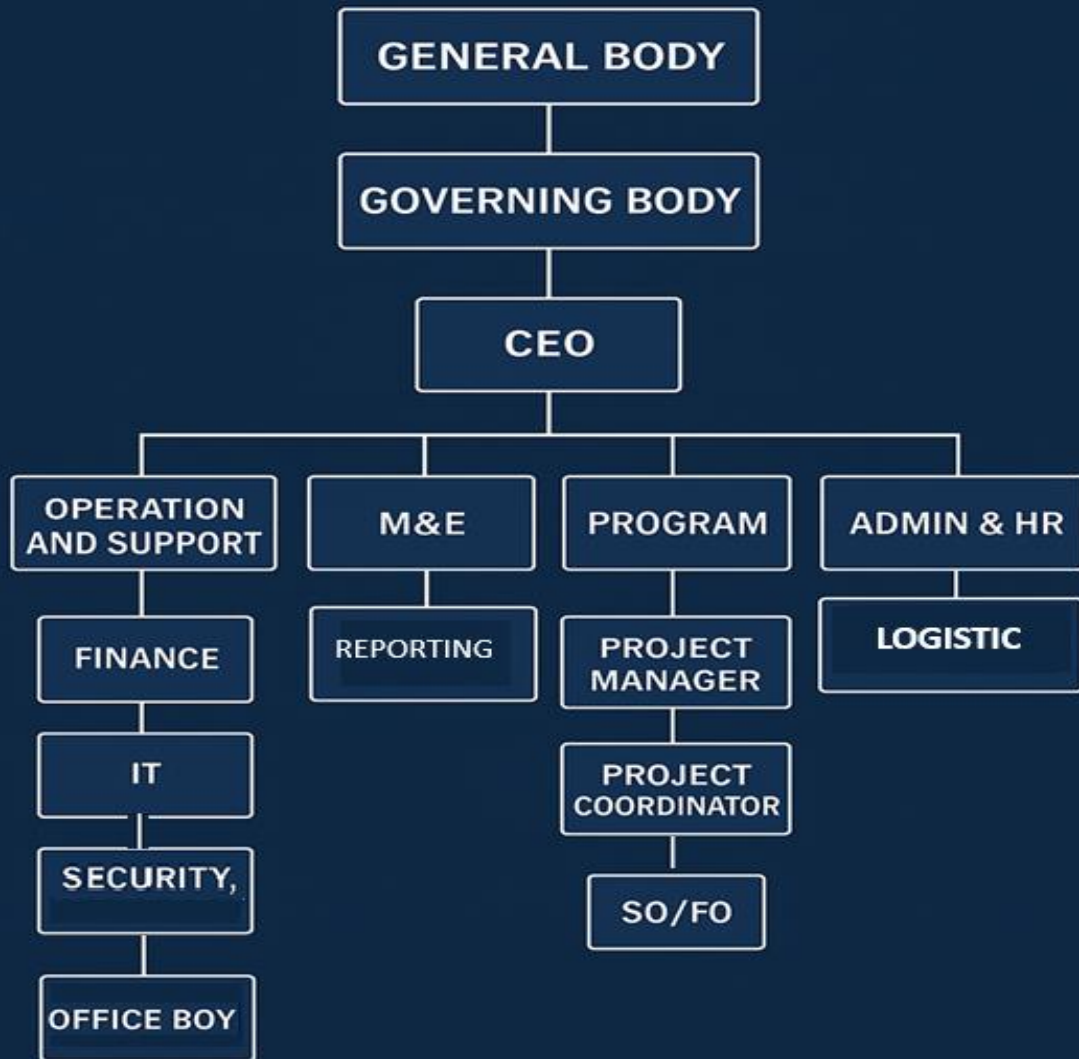

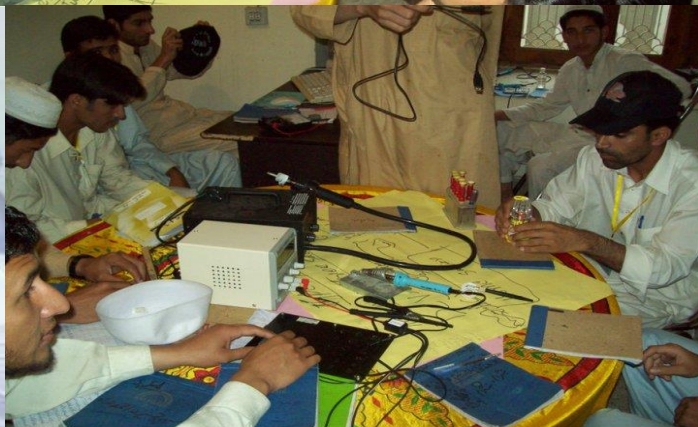
